

2016 Annual Report

Dear Friends,

The Annual Report for 2016 is filled with stories of how our clients, employees, volunteers, and donors engaged in "instilling hope for lasting change."

Every person who comes in the front door of the Billy Shelper Center is greeted with a sign that reads, "Hope for all who enter." At Home Sweet Home, we strive to live out that promise.

In 2016, 413 men, women, and children received hope-filled residential services and opportunities for lasting changes in their lives during their time at Home Sweet Home. While staying with us they had daily interactions with caring and compassionate residential associates, case managers, kitchen staff, volunteers, and work service supervisors who inspired them towards life changes.

Our 402 active members of the Bread for Life Food Co-op found meaningful work in a supportive environment and formed friendships that encouraged and sustained them. A lasting change for them was earning the opportunity to select foods for their families, rather than depending on a handout.

Our Mobile Health Project, operated in partnership with the Community Health Care Clinic, held 16 clinics and provided 108 patient interactions at Home Sweet Home Ministries and the McLean County Center for Human Services. The individuals served were able to overcome numerous barriers to receiving medical care and experienced improved health and hope as a result.

24 participants and 8 allies discovered hope while learning what it means to have a faith-focused orientation to financial health through our Faith and Finances classes.

2016 was no different than the past 99 years in terms of the community's strong commitment to supporting our mission. Especially noteworthy are Midwest Food Bank and the churches that participated in Day of Hope, Bridge of Hope, and Big Give Sunday.

During 2017 we will celebrate 100 years of hope, looking back at our history and looking forward to our future. Please plan to join us during this year of celebration.

Outreach Services


Goals for 201
