Dora Wakefield, a Bread for Life Food Co-op member for over 2 years, loves to help in Home Sweet Home's warehouse garden.

"I'm just so grateful to God that he allows me to be able to do this," shares Dora.

Since May, volunteers and co-op members have been hard at work planting and maintaining a variety of vegetables and herbs.

"We are out here planting cabbage," states Dora. "My job is to dig holes and plant the plants."

Equipped with her hat and trowel, Dora clearly enjoys tending to the garden. She says it's a lot of fun learning how to space plants correctly, but it's even more fun to eat all those delicious greens.

Since 1917, food donations have played a huge role in what we as a ministry have been able to accomplish.

Billy Shelper reported in the 1930's that the Mission often served meals to more than 150 people a day. With the aid of the community, the Mission extended its reach to feed even more in need. Pictured here is a huge donation of food in big barrels and burlap sacks that the Williams Oil-O-Matic Company provided for a Christmas dinner in 1930.

Now in 2017, we continue to have several community partners, including local churches and businesses that help us meet the need in Bloomington-Normal. Last year, food donations helped Home Sweet Home to serve over 104,000 meals and impact more than 400 individuals and families through our Bread for Life Food Co-op.
