Co-op Doors Reopened

As a safety precaution due to COVID-19, the Bread For Life Food Co-op shifted to an emergency response mode of operating in March. Pre-packaged food boxes were provided to anyone in need. Over the next three months, 1,341 food boxes were distributed. As Illinois moved into Phase 4 of the Governor's Restore Illinois plan, the co-op doors were officially reopened on July 13th.

"It has been rough without all of our members, but now that we're getting back into the swing of things, we couldn't be happier," says Samantha Williams, Bread For Life Food Co-op Coordinator. "We've heard from our members countless times 'I've missed everyone,' 'I can't wait to tell you what I've been through,' 'I've missed working and I've been so bored at home with no one to talk to.' It just feels so good to once again join in fellowship as we assist others in providing food for their families."

Many new procedures are in place to ensure the safety of co-op members. At the door before entering, temperature checks are performed and hand sanitizer is offered. There are not as many shifts to work and the number of people allowed in the co-op has been limited. Face masks and gloves are also required to be worn at all times. Gratefully everyone has been very understanding.

Co-op member Shannon says, "I'm just so glad I can come back! My husband has been out of work and I had to have surgery. We've been hurting. This is where I normally get all of my groceries."

HSHM is blessed to be making an indelible difference in the lives of others. Thank you so much for helping our community overcome food deficiencies during these challenging times.
